

TWO SLOGANS. TWO KJV ANSWERS.

Try the self-check.

CLAIM 01 “Modern Bibles
remove Lucifer.”

Check Isaiah
14:12
and 2 Peter 1:19

CLAIM 02 “Holy Spirit is
modern.”

Open the KJV:
Luke 11:13

CHECK ONE: "LUCIFER"

A Latin word is not being deleted.

Hebrew *helel* → shining one / morning-star image → Latin *lucifer*

Isaiah 14 is a taunt against Babylon's king. "Lucifer" entered English from Latin. Latin can use *lucifer* positively: the Vulgate has it at 2 Peter 1:19 where the KJV says "day star." Translating the Hebrew image is not removing Satan's name.

CHECK TWO: "HOLY SPIRIT"

"how much more shall your heavenly Father give the **Holy Spirit** to them that ask him?" **Luke 11:13, KJV**

"grieve not the **holy Spirit** of God..." **Ephesians 4:30, KJV**

Words change. "Ghost" and "Spirit" are both English renderings from the same Greek word family. Neither phrase is a modern attack on the Holy Spirit.

BOTTOM LINE

Before repeating a translation slogan, see whether the KJV itself already answers it.
